Legal Implications

Local Government Act 1995 Section 2.25 Disqualification for Failure to Attend Meetings

- (1) A council may, by resolution grant leave of absence to a member.
- (2) Leave is not to be granted to a member in respect of more than 6 consecutive ordinary meetings of the council without the approval of the minister.
- (3) The granting of leave, or refusal to grant leave and reasons for that refusal, is to be recorded in the minutes for the meeting.
- (4) A member who is absent, without first obtaining leave of the council, throughout 3 consecutive ordinary meetings of the council is disqualified from continuing his or her membership of the council.
- (5) The non-attendance of a member at the time and place appointed for an ordinary meeting of the council does not constitute absence from an ordinary meeting of the council –
- a) If no meeting of the council at which a quorum is present is actually held on that day; or
- b) If the non attendance occurs while
 - i. the member has ceased to act as a member after written notice has been given to the member under section 2.27(3) and before written notice has been given to the member under section 2.27(5)
 - ii. while proceedings in connection with the disqualification of the member have been commenced or are pending; or
 - iii. while the election of the member is disputed and proceedings relating to the disputed election have been commenced and are pending

- (1) all decisions made at the electors meeting are to be considered at the next ordinary council meeting or, if that is not practicable,
- (a) At the next ordinary council meeting after that meeting, or
- (b) At a special meeting called for that purpose, whichever happens first.
- (2) if at a meeting of the council a local government makes a decision in response to a decision made at an electors meeting, the reasons for the decision are to be recorded in the minutes of the council meeting.

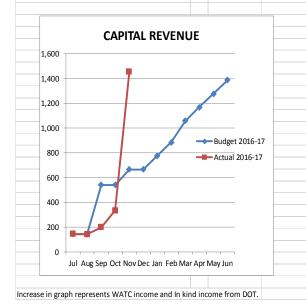

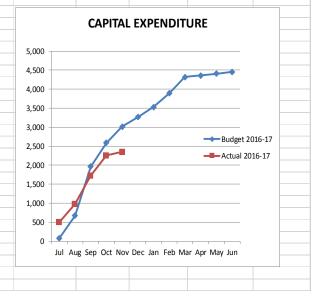

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (a) Basis of Preparation This report has been prepared in accordance with applicable Australian Accounting Standards (as they apply to local government and not-for-profit entities), Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authorative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the Local Government Act 1995 and accompanying regulations. Material accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this budget are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. Except for cash flow and rate setting information, the report has also been prepared on the accrual basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and liabilities. The Local Government Reporting Entity All Funds through which the Council controls resources to carry on its functions have been included in the financial statements forming part of this budget. In the process of reporting on the local government as a single unit, all transactions and balances between those Funds (for example, loans and transfers between Funds) have been eliminated. All monies held in the Trust Fund are excluded from the financial statements. A separate statement of those monies appears at Note 16 to this budget document. (b) Rounding Off Figures All figures shown in this report, other than a rate in the dollar, are rounded to the nearest dollar. (c) Rates, Grants, Donations and Other Contributions Rates, grants, donations and other contributions are recognised as revenues when the local government obtains control over the assets comprising the contributions. Control over assets acquired from rates is obtained at the commencement of the rating period or, where earlier, upon receipt of the rates. (d) Goods and Services Tax (GST) Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with receivables or payables in the statement of financial position. Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows. (e) Superannuation The Council contributes to a number of Superannuation Funds on behalf of employees.

All funds to which the Council contributes are defined contribution plans.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, cash at bank, deposits available on demand with banks, other short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value and bank overdrafts.

Bank overdrafts are shown as short term borrowings in current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(g) Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from ratepayers for unpaid rates and service charges and other amounts due from third parties for goods sold and services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Collectability of trade and other receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts that are known to be uncollectible are written off when identified. An allowance for doubtful debts is raised when there is objective evidence that they will not be collectible.

(h) Inventories

General

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Land Held for Resale

Land held for development and sale is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes the cost of acquisition, development, borrowing costs and holding costs until completion of development. Finance costs and holding charges incurred after development is completed are expensed.

Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss at the time of signing an unconditional contract of sale if significant risks and rewards, and effective control over the land, are passed on to the buyer at this point.

Land held for sale is classified as current except where it is held as non-current based on Council's intentions to release for sale.

(i) Fixed Assets

Each class of fixed assets within either property, plant and equipment or infrastructure, is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Mandatory Requirement to Revalue Non-Current Assets

Effective from 1 July 2012, the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations were amended and the measurement of non-current assets at Fair Value became mandatory.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued) (j) Fixed Assets (Continued) Land Under Control In accordance with Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 16(a), the Council was required to include as an asset (by 30 June 2013), Crown Land operated by the local government as a golf course, showground, racecourse or other sporting or recreational facility of state or regional significance. Upon initial recognition, these assets were recorded at cost in accordance with AASB 116. They were then classified as Land and revalued along with other land in accordance with the other policies detailed in this Note. Whilst they were initially recorded at cost (being fair value at the date of acquisition (deemed cost) as per AASB 116) they were revalued along with other items of Land and Buildings at 30 June 2014. Initial Recognition and Measurement between Mandatory Revaluation Dates All assets are initially recognised at cost and subsequently revalued in accordance with the mandatory measurement framework detailed above. In relation to this initial measurement, cost is determined as the fair value of the assets given as consideration plus costs incidental to the acquisition. For assets acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration, cost is determined as fair value at the date of acquisition. The cost of non-current assets constructed by the Council includes the cost of all materials used in construction, direct labour on the project and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overheads. Individual assets acquired between initial recognition and the next revaluation of the asset class in accordance with the mandatory measurement framework detailed above, are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation as management believes this approximates fair value. They will be subject to subsequent revaluation of the next anniversary date in accordance with the mandatory measurement framework.

Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are recognised against revaluation surplus directly in equity. All other decreases are recognised in profit or loss. Transitional Arrangement During the time it takes to transition the carrying value of non-current assets from the cost approach to the fair value approach, the Council may still be utilising both methods across differing asset classes. Those assets carried at cost will be carried in accordance with the policy detailed in the *Initial Recognition* section as detailed above. Those assets carried at fair value will be carried in accordance with the **Revaluation** Methodology section as detailed above. Land Under Roads In Western Australia, all land under roads is Crown land, the responsibility for managing which, is vested in the local government. Effective as at 1 July 2008, Council elected not to recognise any value for land under roads acquired on or before 30 June 2008. This accords with the treatment available in Australian Accounting Standard AASB 1051 Land Under Roads and the fact Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 16(a)(i) prohibits local governments from recognising such land as an asset. In respect of land under roads acquired on or after 1 July 2008, as detailed above, Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 16(a)(i) prohibits local governments from recognising such land as an asset. Whilst such treatment is inconsistent with the requirements of AASB 1051, Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 4(2) provides, in the event of such an inconsistency, the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations prevail. Consequently, any land under roads acquired on or after 1 July 2008 is not included as an asset of the Council. Depreciation

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings but excluding freehold land, are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the individual asset's useful life from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the improvements.

(k) Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities (Continued)

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset. The fair values of assets that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

To the extent possible, market information is extracted from either the principal market for the asset (i.e. the market with the greatest volume and level of activity for the asset or, in the absence of such a market, the most advantageous market available to the entity at the end of the reporting period (ie the market that maximises the receipts from the sale of the asset after taking into account transaction costs and transport costs).

For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement also takes into account a market participant's ability to use the asset in its highest and best use or to sell it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

Fair Value Hierarchy

AASB 13 requires the disclosure of fair value information by level of the fair value hierarchy, which categorises fair value measurement into one of three possible levels based on the lowest level that an input that is significant to the measurement can be categorised into as follows:

Level 1

Measurements based on quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date.

l evel 2

Measurements based on inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3

Measurements based on unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data. If all significant inputs required to measure fair value are observable, the asset or liability is included in Level 2. If one or more significant inputs are not based on observable market data, the asset or liability is included in Level 3.

Valuation techniques

The Council selects a valuation technique that is appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data is available to measure fair value. The availability of sufficient and relevant data primarily depends on the specific characteristics of the asset or liability being measured. The valuation techniques selected by the Council are consistent with one or more of the following valuation approaches:

Market approach

Valuation techniques that use prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions for identical or similar assets or liabilities.

(I) Financial Instruments (Continued)

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying value with a consequential recognition of an income or expense in profit or loss.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through profit and loss

Financial assets are classified at "fair value through profit or loss" when they are held for trading for the purpose of short term profit taking. Assets in this category are classified as current assets. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying amount being included in profit or loss.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss.

Loans and receivables are included in current assets where they are expected to mature within 12 months after the end of the reporting period.

(iii) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets with fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments that the Council's management has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss.

Held-to-maturity investments are included in current assets where they are expected to mature within 12 months after the end of the reporting period. All other investments are classified as non-current.

(iv) Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either not suitable to be classified into other categories of financial assets due to their nature, or they are designated as such by management. They comprise investments in the equity of other entities where there is neither a fixed maturity nor fixed or determinable payments.

They are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in such fair value (i.e. gains or losses) recognised in other comprehensive income (except for impairment losses). When the financial asset is derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss pertaining to that asset previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified into profit or loss.

Available-for-sale financial assets are included in current assets, where they are expected to be sold within 12 months after the end of the reporting period. All other available for sale financial assets are classified as non-current.

(v) Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities (excl. financial guarantees) are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in the profit or loss.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued) (I) Financial Instruments (Continued) **Impairment** A financial asset is deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events (a "loss event") having occurred, which has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset(s). In the case of available-for-sale financial assets, a significant or prolonged decline in the market value of the instrument is considered a loss event. Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss immediately. Also, any cumulative decline in fair value previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified to profit or loss at this point. In the case of financial assets carried at amortised cost, loss events may include: indications that the debtors or a group of debtors are experiencing significant financial difficulty, default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; indications that they will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; and changes in arrears or economic conditions that correlate with defaults. For financial assets carried at amortised cost (including loans and receivables), a separate allowance account is used to reduce the carrying amount of financial assets impaired by credit losses. After having taken all possible measures of recovery, if management establishes that the carrying amount cannot be recovered by any means, at that point the written-off amounts are charged to the allowance account or the carrying amount of impaired financial assets is reduced directly if no impairment amount was previously recognised in the allowance account. Derecognition Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights for receipt of cash flows expire or the asset is transferred to another party, whereby the Council no longer has any significant continual involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are discharged, cancelled or expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of the consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss. (m) Impairment of Assets In accordance with Australian Accounting Standards the Council's assets, other than inventories, are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication they may be impaired. Where such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another standard (e.g. AASB 116) whereby any impairment loss of a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other standard.

(m) Impairment of Assets (Continued)

For non-cash generating assets such as roads, drains, public buildings and the like, value in use is represented by the depreciated replacement cost of the asset.

(n) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Council prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when the Council becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services. The amounts are unsecured, are recognised as a current liability and are normally paid within 30 days of recognition.

(o) Employee Benefits

Short-Term Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Council's obligations for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries and sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

The Council's obligations for short-term employee benefits such as wages, salaries and sick leave are recognised as a part of current trade and other payables in the statement of financial position. The Council's obligations for employees' annual leave and long service leave entitlements are recognised as provisions in the statement of financial position.

Other Long-Term Employee Benefits

Provision is made for employees' long service leave and annual leave entitlements not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations or service and employee departures and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Any remeasurements for changes in assumptions of obligations for other long-term employee benefits are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the changes occur.

The Council's obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current provisions in its statement of financial position, except where the Council does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are presented as current provisions.

Where this is the case, they are capitalised as part of the cost of the particular asset until such time as the asset is substantially ready for its intended use or sale. (q) Provisions Provisions are recognised when the Council has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period. (r) Current and Non-Current Classification In the determination of whether an asset or liability is current or non-current, consideration is given to the time when each asset or liability is expected to be settled. The asset or liability is classified as current if it is expected to be settled within the next 12 months, being the Council's operational cycle. In the case of liabilities where the Council does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months, such as vested long service leave, the liability is classified as current even if not expected to be settled within the next 12 months. Inventories held for trading are classified as current even if not expected to be realised in the next 12 months except for land held for sale where it is held as non-current based on the Council's intentions to release for sale.

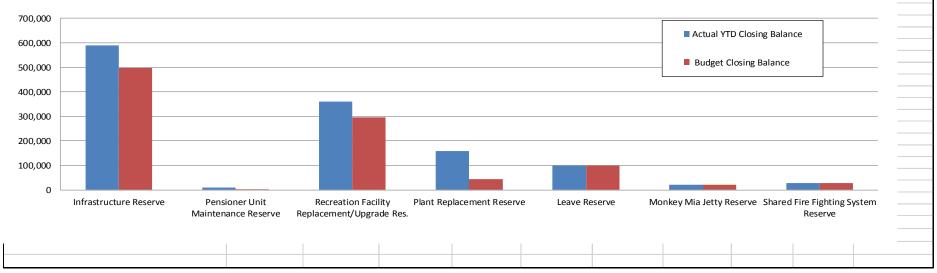

BACKGROUND

Section 5.56 of the *Local Government Act 1995* requires councils to plan for the future of the district. As part of this planning, Regulation 19C and 19DA of the Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996 requires councils to develop a Strategic Community Plan for a period of at least 10 years and a Corporate Business Plan for at least 4 years. In planning for the future, councils are to have regard for the capacity of its current resources and the anticipated capacity of its future resources.

Other documents required by Council as part of this integrated planning for the future are the Long Term Financial Plan, Asset Management Plan and the Workforce Plan.

COMMENT

Strategic Resource Plan 2017-2032

Council adopted its Strategic Community Plan, Corporate Business Plan and Long Term Financial Plan in April 2016. At the Budget adoption in July, it adopted its Asset Management Plan.

At the time of adopting the Asset Management it was explained that a review of this plan would be undertaken in 2016/2017. This has now been completed and, to ensure that there is a correlation between the Asset Management requirements and the ability to fund these requirements, the Long Term Financial Plan has been incorporated into this document to form a Strategic Resource Plan. This integrated Plan is for a period of 15 years and aligns with the Strategic Community Plan.

The Strategic Resource Plan marries the recognition of the need to maintain and renew the Shire's assets, which have predominantly been constructed with the assistance of external contributions, and the long term financial capacity to maintain these assets.

Critical assets have been identified in the Plan – these being the Shire Depot, Recreation Centre and heavy plant and equipment. These assets have been prioritised to help minimise the risk of sudden unexpected failure of these assets. Road maintenance and renewal has been recognised as a high priority for the Shire due to strategic economic benefit that it provides, however this maintenance and renewal is highly dependent on the receipt of external grants.

New projects forecast in the Plan are the boat jinker in 2016/2017, aged units in 2018/2019; multi-use administration facility in 2019/2020 and footpath additions in all years. Total capital expenditure over the life of the Plan totals \$31m.

Financially, the Shire will never achieve independent financial status without the assistance of external grants however, with the current level of operating grants, it can maintain long term financial sustainability and the Plan has been structured on this basis.

Operational revenues and expenditure need to ensure adequate provision for asset renewal and, to achieve this, the Plan uses rates increases marginally higher than CPI.

Borrowings are forecast to remain at low levels in the Plan in order to protect future borrowing capacity to allow Council to respond to unexpected expenditure requirements or the loss of planned external grants. This also allows Council to leverage against future grant funding opportunities as they become available. The Plan also includes use of cash backed reserves to save for future asset renewal requirements.

The Strategic Resource Plan has been developed to achieve improvement in the target ratios levels set out by the Department of Local Government and Communities. The Strategic Resource Plan shows improvements in these ratios over the period.

Corporate Business Plan

As a result of the updated Strategic Resource Plan, the Corporate Business Plan has been updated to ensure alignment of actions and years.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Section 5.56 of the *Local Government Act 1995* requires councils to plan for the future of the district. Regulation 19DA and the Department of Local Government Integrated Planning and Reporting Advisory Standard govern the requirements for these documents.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications with this item.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Corporate Business Plan sets out the actions for the next 4 years in order to achieve the objectives in the Community Strategic Plan. The major projects over this time are expected to be funded by grant or reserve funds and the balance of actions will be funded from operations.

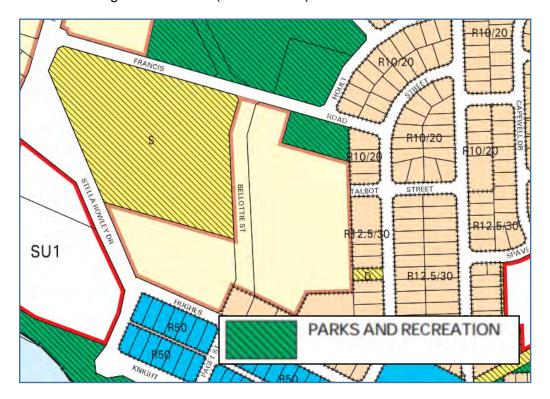

Zoning

Reserve 33517 is reserved for 'Parks and Recreation' under the Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 ('the Scheme').



Location

Existing Reserve 33517 is located near the corner of Francis Road and Brockman Street in Denham townsite. It has an area of 6038m².

The reserve has been developed with an administration building, mini golf, and an existing shed.

The Yadgalah Aboriginal Corporation holds a management order over the reserve for administration centre, recreation and community purposes.

COMMENT

Description of Proposal

An open sided gazebo with a colorbond pitched roof is proposed adjacent to the existing mini golf office. It is proposed to measure 14 metres by 7 metres. The supporting poles will be jarrah.

The structure is proposed to be setback 6.5 metres from the front boundary. Stormwater will be directed into a 5,000 litre rainwater tank.

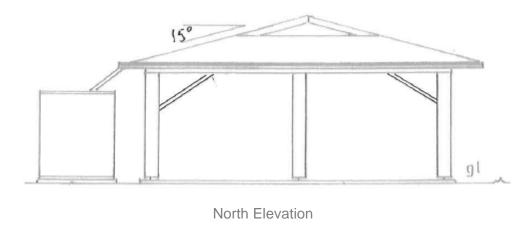


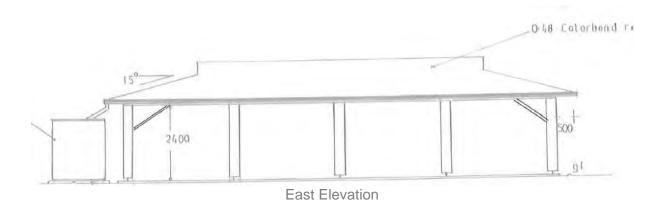
Setbacks are to the discretion of Council. The proposed 6.5 metre setback to Francis Street is not out of keeping with setbacks established on nearby residential lots located to the north east and immediate east of Reserve 33517.

The proposed development is ancillary to existing development on the lot, will provide an undercover area for visitors, and is generally supported.

Under the Scheme, Council must have regard the ultimate purpose of the reserve. The proposed gazebo is considered to be consistent with the purpose of the reserve for 'community purpose' and 'recreation'. The applicant has advised it will be used as shaded area for guests gathering to play mini golf and as a rest area where guests can have refreshments.

Elevations of the proposed structure are included below for ease of reference.





LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 -

Under Clause 3.2.1(b) development cannot be carried out on a reserve without planning approval.

Under Clause 3.2.2 of the Scheme Council is to have regard for general matters outlined in Clause 10.2, and the ultimate purpose of the reserve.

<u>Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015</u> - The <u>Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015</u> were gazetted on 25 August 2015, and became effective on 19 October 2015.

The Regulations include 'Deemed Provisions' that automatically apply and override parts of the Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3.

Regulation 67 outlines 'matters to be considered by Council' including and not limited to the aims and provisions of the Scheme, orderly and proper planning, any approved state policy, the compatibility of the development with its setting including to development on adjoining land, amenity, loading, access, and traffic.

 - (ii) All commercial activities are to be confined to the area shown as the 'licence area' on plans lodged with the application dated 13 October 2016. The plans lodged with this application dated 13 October 2016 shall form part of this planning approval.
 - (iii) The area to be used for aquaculture purposes shall be appropriately designated with a series of marker buoys/beacons as stated in the application.
 - (iv) If the development the subject of this approval is not substantially commenced within a period of 2 years, the approval shall lapse and be of no further effect.
- 4. Advise the applicant via footnote advice on the planning approval as follows:
 - (a) No approval has been granted for any activities within adjacent Unallocated Crown Land located between the waterways / ocean and Lot 2, Nanga. A separate future application would be required if any commercial activities or development are planned within the Unallocated Crown Land and an application form would need to be endorsed by State Land Services.

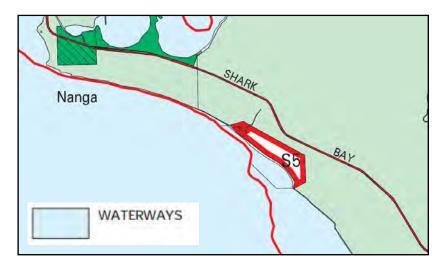
- (b) As you are aware, a separate aquaculture licence is required to obtained from the Department of Fisheries. It is noted that the Department will require implementation of an Aquaculture Management and Environmental Monitoring Plan.
- (c) As you aware separate approval is required from State Land Services to secure access to the ocean through the adjacent Unallocated Crown Land.

BACKGROUND

• Local Scheme Reserve – Waterways

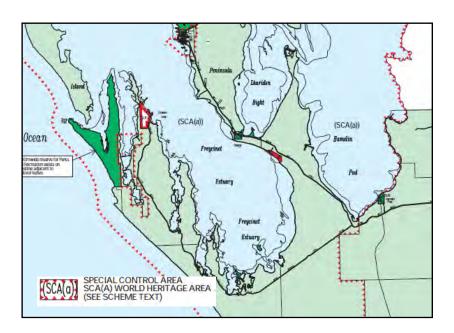
The ocean to the immediate west of Nanga is a Local Scheme Reserve for 'Waterways'. Waterways is also listed as a local scheme reserve under Clause 3.1 of the Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 ('the Scheme').



The red line on the scheme map that follows the coastline is the local government boundary. The local government boundary has changed since gazettal of the Scheme.

• Special Control Area – World Heritage

The waterway is within the Special Control Area for the Shark Bay World Heritage Property area.



• Previous Council consideration

A report on this planning application was considered by Council at the meeting held on the 26 October 2016. Council resolved to advertise the application.

COMMENT

Description of Application

A planning application has been signed by the Department of Transport who has jurisdiction over the waterways proposed to be used for aquaculture. The planning application has been lodged so that the related aquaculture licence (and lease) can be progressed.

The applicant seeks to utilise a 400.6 hectare area for aquaculture. A copy of the site plan is included at the end of this report.

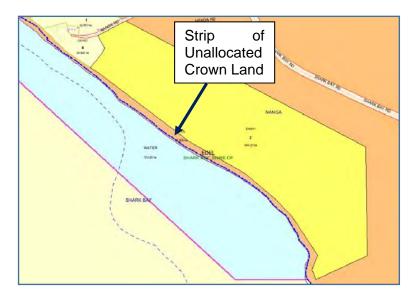
The proposed species include edible oysters, pearl oysters, sea cucumbers/sand fish, abalone, clams and sponges.

The applicant has advised that:

- A range of farming methodologies will be employed dependent on the subject species, inclusive of both surface and subsurface technologies such as longlines, fencelines, racks, baskets, panels, purpose built grow-out structures and ranching.
- There is potential for the listed species to be farmed in unison.
- The proposed aquaculture area will be appropriately demarcated in accordance with the Department of Transport requirements using a series of marker buoys/beacons.
- No additional land based infrastructure is proposed as part of this application, however, this may be explored in the future subject to further investigations as to the feasibility of such development.

Access

The applicant has advised that access to the waterway will be via a strip of Unallocated Crown Land which sits between Lot 2 and the waterline – refer plan below.



In order to secure tenure over this unallocated crown land for the purposes of access, a Licence under Section 91 of the *Land Administration Act (1997)* is currently being arranged between Pan Holdings Pty Ltd ('the proponent') and the Department of Lands.

The applicant advises that it is anticipated that the Licence will be issued for a period of 24 months as an interim measure, with an easement being pursued thereafter to provide tenure in the longer term.

The Department of Lands consulted with the Shire in regards to access over the unallocated crown land and the matter was considered by Council on the 28 September 2016. The Shire has notified the Department of Lands that it has no objection any licence, lease or easement over the unallocated crown land.

Advertising / Consultation

The application has been advertised for public comment. Advertising included:

- Letters to nearby and adjacent landowners
- Publication of a public notice in the Midwest Times
- Display of a public notice on the Shire noticeboard
- Letters to the Shark Bay World Heritage Advisory Committee and the Department of Parks of Wildlife.

No submissions from the general public or the Shark bay World Heritage Advisory Committee were received during advertising.

Department of Parks and Wildlife has advised that they already provided comment directly to the Department of Fisheries on the separate aquaculture licence. The only comment from Department of Parks and Wildlife on the planning application was a

recommendation that 'the Shire consideration of the application take into account the outcome of Pan Holdings Pty Ltd application for an aquaculture license lodged with Department of Fisheries'.

The aquaculture licence being pursued through Department of Fisheries is under separate legislation and is not under the Shires jurisdiction. Gray & Lewis has verbally advised Department of Parks and Wildlife that conditions cannot be imposed on any planning approval that relates to third party approvals or separate legislation.

The main pieces of <u>legislation</u> that Department of Fisheries use to regulate aquaculture are the *Fish Resources Management Act 1994* and the *Fish Resources Management Regulations 1995*. This legislation has separate requirements which should not be duplicated by any planning approval.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015 –

Regulation 61 outlines 'development for which development approval is not required' and does not provide any exemption for development in a local scheme reserve.

Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 – Clause 3.2.1 of the Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 ('the Scheme') states that 'a person must not (a) use a Reserve; or (b) commence or carry out development on a Local Reserve, with first having obtained planning approval...'

Accordingly the proposed aquaculture use requires planning approval.

Clause 3.2.2 requires the local government to have regard the matters set out in Clause 10.2, and the ultimate purpose intended for the reserve. The Scheme does not specify any ultimate purpose of the waterway reserve.

The Scheme has a definition for 'agriculture – intensive' which means premises used for trade or commercial purposes, including outbuildings and earthworks, associated with the following:

- the production of grapes, vegetables, flowers, exotic or native plants, or fruit or nuts:
- b) the establishment and operation of plant or fruit nurseries;
- c) the development of land for irrigated fodder production or irrigated pasture (including turf farms); or
- d) aquaculture.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications relative to this report.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Shire pays consultancy fees to Gray & Lewis for planning advice.

The applicant was invoiced for the cost of the newspaper advert in the Midwest Times.

STRATEGIC IMPLICATIONS

The Shires Local Planning Strategy makes no significant recommendations in regards to Nanga or the adjacent waterways.

The Shark Bay Regional Strategy 1997 provides guidance for land, water and resource use and management in the World Heritage Property and provides specific commentary on the high level planning strategies to protect and enhance World Heritage Values.

The Strategy designates the marine waters adjacent to Nanga which are the subject of this application as being for 'Intensive Marine Use'. 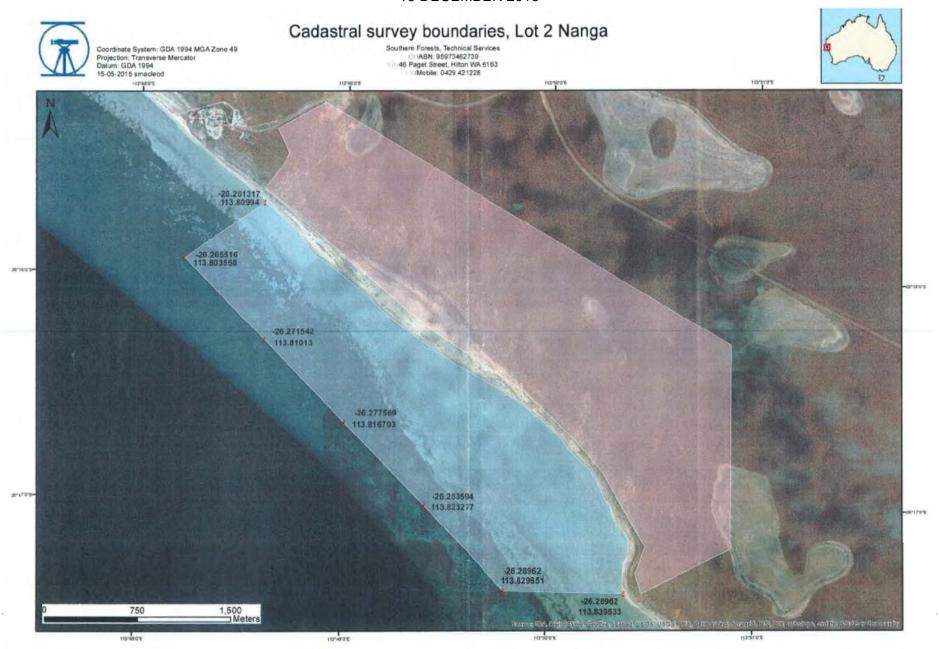

BACKGROUND

Zoning

The ocean to the immediate west of Nanga is a Local Scheme Reserve for 'Waterways'. Waterways is also listed as a local scheme reserve under Clause 3.1 of the Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 ('the Scheme').

History

An application has been lodged by Pan Holdings Pty Ltd for an aquaculture licence and lease to the Department of Fisheries.

Department of Fisheries has referred the application to the Shire and requested comments by the 14 August 2016. The matter was considered by Council at the meeting held on the 28 September 2016. The Shire requested that the licence be placed on hold as the proposal required a separate planning approval for the aquaculture activities.

COMMENT

Description of Application

The applicant seeks to utilise a 400.6 hectare area for aquaculture – refer plan below.



The proposed species include edible oysters, pearl oysters, sea cucumbers/sand fish, abalone, clams and sponges.

Consultation

On behalf of the Shire, Gray & Lewis has referred the application to the Shark Bay World Heritage Advisory Committee and Department of Parks and Wildlife.

The application is supported by a Management and Environmental Monitoring Plan which outlines species and quantity, farm methods, monitoring, bio-security, auditing and review.

Both the Shark Bay World Heritage Advisory Committee and the Department of Parks and Wildlife provided comments on the original Management and Environmental Monitoring Plan. It has subsequently been revised by the applicant.

Gray & Lewis has recently liaised with the Department of Fisheries who advised that 'all the comments raised by DPaW through this consultation have been addressed in the Management and Environmental Monitoring Plan and licence conditions.'

The Shark Bay World Heritage Advisory Committee has not lodged any further comments on the revised Management and Environmental Monitoring Plan.

Recommendation

Planning issues relating to the proposed aquaculture use have been resolved through lodgement of a separate planning application. It is recommended that the proposed licence be supported.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015 – Regulation 61 outlines 'development for which development approval is not required' and does not provide any exemption for development in a local scheme reserve.

Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 -

Clause 3.2.1 of the Shire of Shark Bay Local Planning Scheme No 3 ('the Scheme') states that 'a person must not (a) use a Reserve; or (b) commence or carry out development on a Local Reserve, with first having obtained planning approval...'

Clause 3.2.2 requires the local government to have regard the matters set out in Clause 10.2, and the ultimate purpose intended for the reserve.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications relative to this report.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Shire pays consultancy fees to Gray & Lewis for planning advice.

STRATEGIC IMPLICATIONS

The Shires Local Planning Strategy makes no significant recommendations in regards to Nanga or the adjacent waterways.

The Shark Bay Regional Strategy 1997 designates the marine waters adjacent to Nanga which are the subject of this application as being for 'Intensive Marine Use'. Table 2 of the Strategy states that these areas were specifically not included within the Shark Bay Marina Park to allow for commercial development and managed intensive use such as marine facilities associated with urban, industrial, tourism and recreational activity.

That Council pursuant to Section 21(1)(b)(i) Part 2 of the Public Health Act 2016 resolves to delegate all the powers and duties conferred or imposed on the Shire of Shark Bay by the Public Health Act 2016 to the Chief Executive Officer.

BACKGROUND

The gazettal of the *Public Health Act 2016* represents a significant update and change to the implementation of environmental health legislation, replacing the *Health Act 1911*. As there is a significant amount of work required to transition to the new regulatory framework, the Department of Health (WA) has advised that implementation is to occur in a staged manner over the next 3 to 5 years.

The old *Health Act 1911* (which will be known as the *Health* (*Miscellaneous Provisions*) *Act 1911*), and all regulations made under the Health Act, will continue to be the main enforcement tool used by the Shire's Environmental Health Officers until the provisions of the new Act are proclaimed over the coming years.

There are five (5) stages of implementation, of which Stages 1 and 2 are already in effect and have no practical implications for local government. Stage 3 involves key elements of the administrative framework provided by Part 2 of the *Public Health Act 2016* coming into operation to replace the equivalent administrative framework provided by Part II of the *Health Act 1911*. This includes gazettal of Environmental Health Officers to enforce the provisions of the Act within their local government authority and annual reporting requirements.

Stage 3 is expected to occur on 24th January 2017, with works needed to be undertaken to effect this transition within the Shire of Shark Bay.

Stage 4 will adopt changes to the *Public Health Act 2016* relating to notifiable infectious diseases and related conditions, prescribed conditions of health, serious public health incident powers and public health emergencies. Date for commencement is yet to be determined. No action by local government is expected during this implementation stage.

Stage 5 will be the most significant stage of implementation for enforcement agencies as it represents the point at which they move from the framework provided by the *Health (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1911* to the *Public Health Act 2016*. The development of new regulations under the *Public Health Act 2016* relating to environmental health matters will commence, and feature provisions for:

- the built environment
- water
- body art and personal appearances
- pests and vectors.

Equivalent provisions in the *Health (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1911* and regulations and by-laws made under that Act will be repealed.

The following provisions will also commence with the enforcement provisions:

- Public Health Planning
- Public Health Assessments and
- Registration and licensing

Stage 5 will require substantial works by local government to implement this stage. The Department of Health has advised that it will be working closely with Local Government Authorities in the lead up to this stage, including consultation on the development of the required regulations.

All currently employed Environmental Health Officers will automatically be authorised officers and will continue to enforce both the new and the old public health legislation as the transition continues. However, implementation of Stage 3 requires that they must be provided a certificate of authority, to be produced on request. The Shire's authorised delegate is required to sign the certificate.

Using section 21(1)(b)(i) Part 2 of the new *Public Health Act 2016*, Council may delegate the powers and duties conferred on it to the Chief Executive Officer or an authorised officer of the Local Government. At this time, the effect of the delegation being sought is minor (sign the certificate), however as further provisions are gazetted to expand the powers of the *Public Health Act 2016*, this delegation will provide for the smooth implementation of these provisions as they are implemented.

Precedent for this is already in place for the Health Act (Delegation 30) which enables the Chief Executive Officer to act on behalf of Council in respect to the Act and associated Regulations. This includes initiating legal action on behalf of the Shire for breaches of the *Health Act 1911*. The current delegation will need to remain in place during the transition to the new *Public Health Act 2016*.

COMMENT

The designation of authorised officers and the appointment of Environmental Health Officer's is now the responsibility of Local Government (enforcement agency). The Department of Health no longer has a role in the designation or appointment of Environmental Health Officer's/authorised officers.

Once Stage 3 comes into effect, all designations must be made under the *Public Health Act 2016*, and no longer under the *Health Act 1911* (to be renamed the Health (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1911)

Section 17 of the new *Public Health Act 2016*, provides Council the ability to appoint Environmental Health Officers/Authorised Officers without the need to apply for approval from the Health Department of WA. As such Council will need to provide delegation to the Chief Executive Officer to carry out this new function.

Section 24 of the new *Public Health Act 2016* provides Council the ability to designate a person or class of persons as Authorised Officers and to issue authority cards to those officers. This function was previously carried out by the Health Department of WA. Council will now need to provide delegation to the Chief Executive Officer to carry this new function.

BACKGROUND

In the 2016/2017 Annual Budget, Council allocated \$60,000 in financial assistance and donations to community groups. Historically there have been two grant rounds issued through the financial year. Clubs are encouraged to apply for larger amounts in the first round to facilitate timely acquittals.

Applications for the second round of assistance grants for the 2016/2017 financial year were invited on 28 October 2016 and closed 2 December 2016. The open round was advertised in the Inscription Post, Facebook – Shark Bay Buy and Sell, as well as an individual email out to all clubs and groups in Shark Bay. Five applications were received. Copies of the applications will be circulated under separate cover.

If the five applications above are approved, this will bring the total funds expended in the 2016/2017 Shire of Shark Bay Community Grants to \$40,308 (Round 1 total \$17,909 plus round 2 \$22,399). Leaving a total of \$19,692 of the budgeted \$60,000 funds.

COMMENT

Round 2, 2016/2017 Donations and Financial Assistance Grant round has received a low number of applications from the community. This may be attributed to the clubs and community groups being encouraged to apply for funding through the Gascoyne Development Commission and other external funding sources.

Many Shark Bay clubs and groups have received funding thought the Gascoyne Development Commission, Lottery West, Royalties for Regions, Healthways and Horizon Power for various local projects, this success has resulted in more money being brought into the region and extensive improvements to the services provided in Shark Bay.

BACKGROUND

October 2016 saw the highly successful delivery of the Dirk Hartog 400 year Commemorations and 5-day Festival of Discovery. The planning, resourcing and implementation of this historical event was heavily supported by State, regional, local and International governments.

The aim of the 5-day festival was to capitalise on the investment in the historical event thereby increasing the visitor numbers into Shark Bay during an otherwise *low season* period.

Along with local business, the strong commitment and engagement from the community through a range of festival programs (Shark Bay Entertainers, Shark Bay Community Resource Centre, Shark Bay Arts Council, Shark Bay Tourism and Speedway), helped push the message that Shark Bay was *open for business*.

<u>COMMENT</u>

Considerations for deciding on an event for 2017

There is evidence that the 2016 event delivered strong economic and tourism benefits for Shark Bay with a return on investment of \$17.3 for every \$1.00 spent by the Shire.

In summary, the face-to-face, on-line and business survey feedback strongly demonstrated that:

Visitors: Would come back to Shark Bay for festivals which focused on

music/concerts and historical themes

Locals: Highlighted music/concerts and food themes.

Feedback from the South of Perth and Fremantle Yacht Clubs is that they are considering a biennial Yacht Race from Fremantle to Denham, therefore bypassing Geraldton. The concept is that the race should be a continuous event without any 'stop-overs'.

Economic & political considerations

- 2016 400 year commemorations attracted large and state-wide grants in support of the historical nature of the celebrations
- Shire of Shark Bay also invested considerable funds over two years
- It took up to four years and a number of State and local committees to create and implement the Dirk Hartog Commemorations
- The historical nature of the event meant that it was easy to promote and market to a broader and international audience
- A State Government election is to be held in early 2017 impacting on timely access to grants, especially Royalties for Regions.
- If a new government is elected, time lapse in transitional periods will also impact on timeliness of grants available

State Budget 2016/2017 (Tourism potential)

- The net operating balance is forecast to be in deficit in 2016/2017, reflecting a projected shortfall between revenue (of \$25.7 billion) and recurrent spending (or expenses, of \$29.6 billion). General government revenue is expected to decline for the third year in a row in 2016/2017, which is unprecedented. Despite the Government's success in reining in expense growth, the broader economic and revenue environment means that operating deficits are unavoidable in the near term.
- \$30 million over four years (to 2020) for tourism events, conferences and destination marketing (mainly metro focused)

Maritime History

The historical importance of Shark Bay in scientific, exploratory and cartographic terms has been clearly documented. The principal significance of the area historically is that it is the site of the earliest recorded European landfall on the West Australian coast. Shark Bay, therefore, may be said to represent the opening chapter of Western Australian history.

Hartog's landfall heralded the beginning of a series of explorations by Dutch, English and French navigators, many of whom called at Shark Bay and charted its waters.

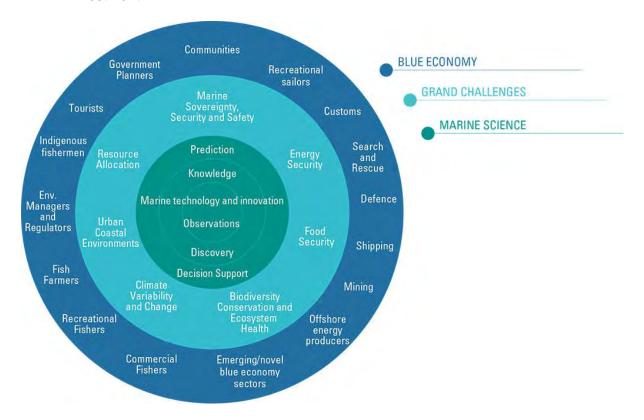

On Tuesday 25 October, the Shark Bay Fish Factory presented a 'Taste of Shark Bay' through a traditional menu fare at the foreshore. The seafood menu at the VIP function in the Discovery Centre was sponsored by the Shark Bay Prawn Trawler's Association. Both events were highly regarded and extremely popular.

The Blue Economy

Australia's ocean industry sectors such as marine tourism, offshore oil and gas, aquaculture, commercial and recreational fishing and shipping, contribute significantly to the national economy: a recent evaluation of Australia's maritime industries conservatively valued the 'Ocean economy' in 2011/2012 at more than \$47 billion, having almost doubled since 2002/2003.

The concept of the 'blue economy' in the Indo-Pacific rim is evolving, with more countries and businesses wishing to tap ocean resources for economic growth and investment.



Heritage & Eco-Tourism

In 2006, Western Australia developed a Heritage Tourism Strategy. The aim of the strategy is to increase heritage tourism experiences across WA, to raise awareness of the importance of our heritage, and to encourage the ongoing conservation of Western Australia's heritage places.

Heritage tourism has the potential to considerably improve the economic vitality of numerous Western Australian communities, broaden Western Australia's tourism base and improve awareness, appreciation and conservation of our physical and intangible heritage.

The rich, ancient landscape and the abundant natural resources it holds have fuelled economic booms and shaped our towns and cities. It has created Western Australians' optimistic and confident outlook. Understanding a place's heritage is important to understanding who they are. Heritage tourism helps to create a strong sense of place and identity.

It is this desire to understand what makes a place special and unique that has fuelled the growth in heritage tourism. Heritage tourists tend to stay longer, spend more, and seek out experiences in museums and art galleries, historical and heritage buildings, sites and monuments.

Ecotourism is a form of tourism involving visiting fragile, pristine, and relatively undisturbed natural areas, intended as a low-impact and often small scale alternative to standard commercial (mass) tourism.

Ecotourism typically involves travel to destinations where flora, fauna, and cultural heritage are the primary attractions. Ecotourism is intended to offer tourists insight into the impact of human beings on the environment, and to foster a greater appreciation of our natural habitats. There is also a growing interest in 'Citizen Science' as an element in eco-tourism.

For the past 40 years the UNESCO World Heritage Convention has conserved, protected and presented the Outstanding Universal Value of our shared heritage. These unique natural and cultural wonders represent our past and present, and belong to all. World Heritage properties are important travel destinations that if managed properly, have great potential impact for local economic development and long-term sustainability.

Shark Bay World Heritage Area is one of the most important natural treasures on Earth. In 1991 it was ranked alongside places such as the Galápagos Islands, the Great Barrier Reef and the Grand Canyon as a site of global environmental significance.

Shark Bay Marine Park is Australia's largest marine embayment at a size of 748,735 hectares. The bay is home to a myriad of aquatic wildlife including dolphins, dugongs, manta rays and turtles and some 17 species of mammals including humpback whales, 98 species of reptiles and amphibians and more than 230 species of birds.

Comment

At the time of the report presented in the July ordinary council meeting it was unknown that Main Roads Western Australia had committed to a reseal program on the Monkey Mia Road.

It has since been confirmed that Main Roads Western Australia will be commencing a reseal program on the Monkey Mia Road in 2017/2018 and 2018/2019. Main Roads Western Australia have suggested that the Shire of Shark Bay enter into a joint resealing program to take advantage of the economy of scales that will be gained from a joint venture.

Main Roads would take all responsibility and tendering protocols associated with their tendering procedures alleviating the need for the Shire of Shark Bay to call for tenders.

From previous experience on the Hamelin Pool Road this process of joint sealing programs with Main Roads Western Australia can potentially have huge cost advantages to the Shire of Shark Bay. Essentially Regional Road Group funds associated with reseals will go a further and any savings will be reallocated to future Regional Road Group projects associated with the Shire of Shark Bay.

As such, an out of session approval has be asked for from the Regional Road Group to reschedule the approved Regional Road Group programs for this year and next year to take advantage of any potential savings.

The approvals being sought are as follows:

Introduce Ocean Park Road shoulders into 2016/2017 Change Nanga Bay Road reseal from 2016/2017 to 2017/2018

With this in mind and the fact that the Monkey Mia Road will be resealed over two financial years, 2017/2018 and 2018/2019, it is suggested that the following changes are made to the 5 year capital road plan:

Introduce Ocean Park Road shoulders into 2016/2017

Change Nanga Bay Road reseal from 2016/2017 to 2017/2018.

Change Ocean Park reseal from 2018/2019 to 2020/2021

Change Eagle Bluff re-sheet from 2018/2019 to 2020/2021

Background

The 5 year Road Capital plan proposed road works schedule contains an estimated Capital expenditure on roads within the Shire of Shark Bay for the next 5 years.

Comment

There is an established 5 year road capital plan for capital works on rural and urban roads within the Shire of Shark Bay. This plan has been put into place to show the projected years that works will be completed and also the sections of those roads that, at this point in time, have been deemed to be in most need for capital works.

As road use changes and given the fact that certain events will occur out of our control, the projected years shown in the inserted spread sheet are estimates of the proposed works and time frames involved.

This Road Capital plan is a living document and needs to be reviewed annually. This will ensure that capital expenditure will be spent in a most productive manner.

Regional Road Group projects for 2016/2017 include a re-sheet program on the Useless Loop Road between SLK 13 to SLK 18.5. This will involve contractors carting sheeting material from the gravel pit at SLK 28 and Shire laying out the material to achieve a 150mm coverage. Some extra works will be undertaken to do some minor realignments and form work in preparation for the expected 2017/18 seal program on the Useless Loop Road. It is estimated these works will come to \$377,600.00. Also included in the RRG funding is the part resealing of the Nanga Road, associated costs will be \$90,000.00.

The Shire of Shark Bay has an allocation of approximately 1.26 million dollars over the next 3 years. A workshop with councillor participation was held on the 11th of February 2016 to discuss potential road requirements within the Shire. Councillors indicated that

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they would like to concentrate primarily on town streets with some expenditure on the Woodleigh-Byro Road.

The following table represents the Roads to Recovery allocations for the Shire of Shark Bay.

With this in mind the following roads have been costed and presented for Council approval for 2016/17.

Woodleigh-Byro Road:

The Woodleigh-Byro Road from SLK 84 (Cross Roads) to SLK 120 (Shire Boundary). This section of the Woodleigh-Byro Road is in need of some maintenance. It is proposed to resheet the road as required with forming and shaping in the remaining areas. Extra drainage will be installed as required with grids cleaned and batters maintained. The estimated cost involved with this project will be \$150,000.00.

Knight Terrace:

Knight Terrace from the western end round-a-bout to the eastern end round-a-bout will be resealed with asphalt. The cost implication involved would be approximately \$360,000.00. This reseal would enhance the foreshore revitalisation projects already underway.

Old Knight Terrace:

Old Knight Terrace in conjunction with Knight Terrace would be looked at to formalise the parking at and around the Shark Bay Supermarket whilst also implementing a suitable path for the jinker to navigate the western end round-a-bout. The storm water drainage issues would also be addressed at this stage. An allocation of \$150,000.00 has been given to this project.
